



## Evidencing the Impact of Primary PE and Sport Premium 2023-2024

### Key achievements to date

1. We organise a series of successful football festivals each year.
2. We have independently raised the sum of £75,000 to provide the children with an all-weather sport pitch.
3. We provide a vibrant Forest School for all the children that increases active outdoor learning.
4. We offer a four-day activity based residential for our year four children during the Easter Holidays.
5. We participate fully in the local School Sports Partnership.
6. We have achieved the Platinum School Sports Award.
7. We operate a whole school sports day.
8. We have a successful Saturday football school.
9. We have successfully funded a new minibus to enable increased participation in sporting events.
10. Our wrap around care now includes a range of sporting activities.

### Areas for Further Improvement and Baseline Evidence of Need

1. To improve our performance in the School Sports Partnership Competitions
2. Increase the number of House Competitions that we hold to include tag rugby, cricket and netball.
